ANGRY HUNGER STRIKERS RIOT FOR HOURS IN MARYLAND PEN

City Policemen Respond to Call and Warden Resorts to Fire Hose After Electric Lights Torn Out

BALTIMORE, MD., AUG. 20.—More than 50 "hunger strikers" started a riot in a dormitory of the Maryland penitentiary here early this morning. Shortly before 3 o'clock the men, who had been segregated, tore out the electric lights, and with the building in darkness, started a demonstration that lasted for two hours.

DORMITORY IS WRECKED. Dormitory C, in which the prisoners participating in the riot were segregated, is a wreck today. The big steel gate leading to the yard was badly bent; cell doors and interior iron bars were wrenched from their places and gaping holes were dug in the brick walls.

IRISH AMBUSH AND CAPTURE 13 SOLDIERS IN MILITARY LORRY

Lieutenant Sharmen Commanding Military Patrol Killed and Four of His Men Wounded in Battle With Civilians

DUBLIN, IRELAND, AUG. 20.—Thirteen fully armed soldiers returning last night to Ballymore in a military lorry were ambushed. After sharp firing from both sides the soldiers were forced to surrender and were disarmed by civilians. Four of the soldiers were wounded. They were rushed to a nearby hospital.

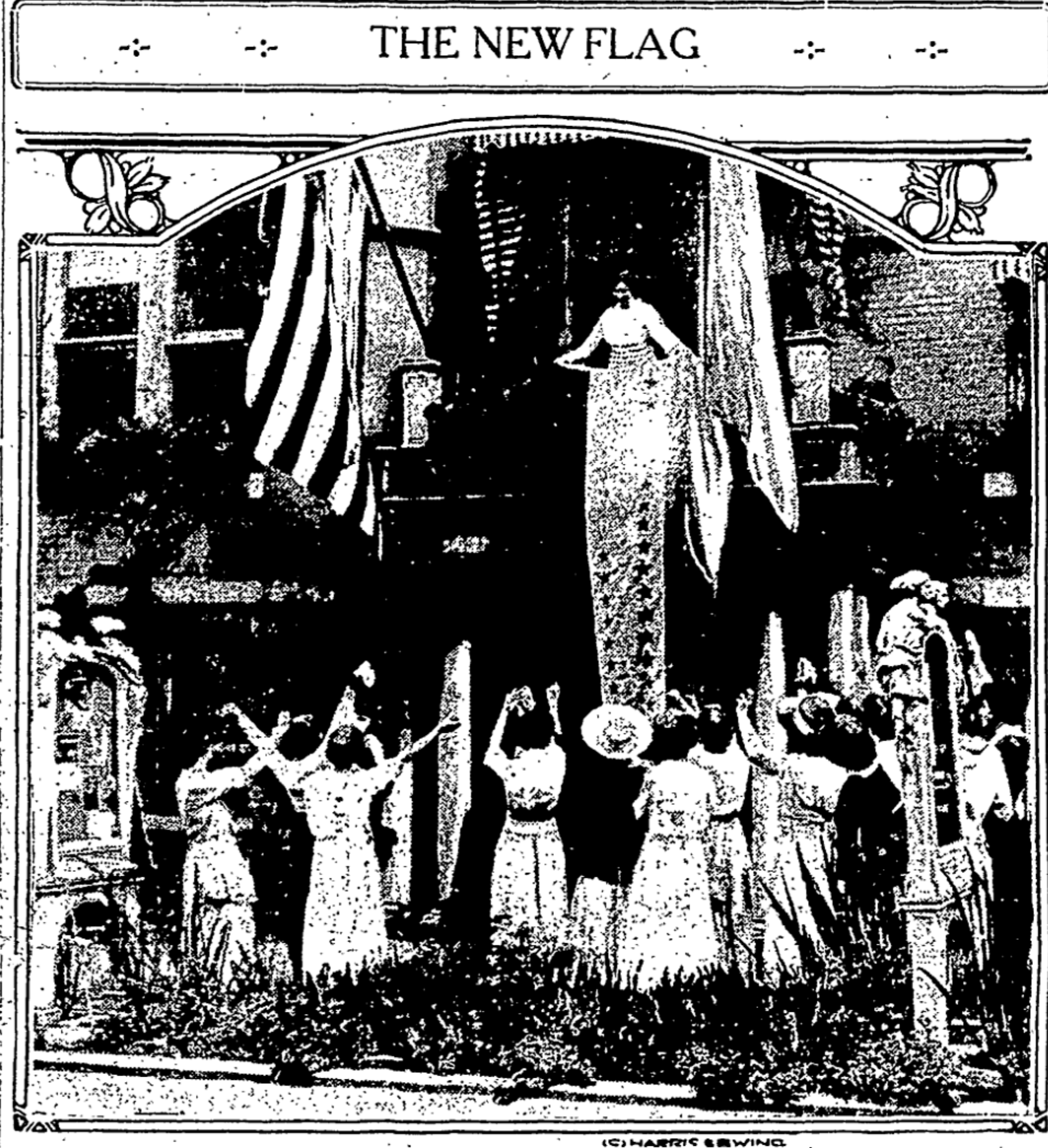
